Unit 4-19

[Language connection: Note the two pronunciations of 'content'; commas used with dates; use of the apostrophe with the possessive noun (Michael's); use of an apostrophe in a contraction; use of a comma to separate parts of a compound sentence (# 1); capitalise: title (Governor) name (Michael, Jill).]

- 1. My class was quite <u>excited</u> about Governor Michael's visit to our school on December 18, 2006, and we were <u>eager</u> to make him <u>comfortable</u>.
- 2. The <u>fanciest</u> dress was worn by a masked mystery woman. We were <u>delighted</u> and <u>surprised</u> to discover it was our dancing teacher Jill.
- 3. Was the leader <u>embarrassed</u> or <u>puzzled</u> that his men had not <u>completed</u> the <u>simplest</u> assignment?
- 4. She wasn't <u>content</u> having <u>earlier</u> won the prize but it still turned out to be the <u>loveliest</u> night ever.

[Language connection: indentation of paragraph optional; apostrophe in contractions; commas after time and order (sequence) words; interrogatory sentence - question mark; capitalise titles, names, parts of letter (Councillor, Smith, Dear - but not truly, special days - Christmas); exclamatory sentence !]

Unit 4-21

[Language connection: Exclamation mark after exclamatory sentences, capitalise the first word in a sentence, homophones - use the correct spelling of words in a sentence; apostrophe in contractions.]

He now rests, scratches his stomach with his <u>paws</u> and <u>chews</u> some fresh grass. [Language connection: Note: Two pronunciations of 'suspect'; Quotation marks; commas following an introductory phrase # 3.]

- After the trip <u>across</u> the <u>desert wilderness</u> the young men were greedily <u>swallowing</u> water. Afterwards they had yoghurt for <u>dessert</u>. "I <u>suspect</u> they were exhausted," the tyrant said.
- 2. During the vacation swimming classes, students must learn to quickly take a deep <u>breath</u> and <u>then breathe</u> out gently under water.
- 3. Before the winter, the people of the village used their extraordinary <u>cloth</u> to make sensational <u>clothes</u>.

Unit 4-23

[Language connection: Use of an apostrophe to indicate a possessive noun (knight's, tree's); comma following an introductory phrase (in 1st sentence).]

During the <u>handsome knight</u>'s <u>reign</u>, <u>anyone</u> wanting <u>knowledge</u> came to the <u>castle</u>. <u>Often</u> the knight would make a <u>sign</u> and get the person to <u>climb</u> up the oak tree's <u>limbs</u>, and then <u>wriggle</u> through a narrow window. They then had to <u>kneel</u>, and <u>listen</u> and wait for the <u>knight</u>'s <u>answer</u>. <u>Sometimes</u> the <u>answer</u> was <u>wrong</u>.
